Gardening Tips for February

Hedges do tend to be taken for granted. If yours looks a little the worse for wear, give it a boost with a dressing of fertiliser or a good manure over the root run. Now is the time to sow cabbage, lettuce, peas and cauliflower in a temperature of 13°C (55°F). Rhubarb can also be planted at this time. Any turfing should be completed as conditions allow. If you have not dealt with summer bedding schemes yet, get planning sorted at your earliest opportunity so that orders can be sent in. The busy season for seed sowing approaches, and it is always worth sowing thinly. This way seedlings have room to develop and will not become overcrowded if pricking out is delayed.

Welcome to the 4th issue of the Parish Council's informal communication trial. This is advanced notice to let you know that we will be setting up a means whereby you the parishioner can give feedback to the PC on whether you would like us to continue with this method of communication. Watch this space for the following issue in March.

The Sustainable Communities Bill

Your PC some time ago agreed to support the above Bill and I have just heard that The Sustainable Communities Bill has now become an Act of Parliament. (http://www.opsi.gov.uk/acts/acts/2007/pdf/ukpga_20070023_en.pdf)

By my understanding of this piece of new legislation; by October 2008 central government will ask North Somerset Council, who will have a legal duty to do so, to set up citizens panels (drawn from all sections of the community) and try to reach an agreement with those panels on suggestions that you, the parishioner make. Then NSC has to submit them to central government and (you will like this) the government has a legal duty to co-operate with NSC to try to reach an agreement on what action it will take on the suggestions made.

This is a major reversal in the power structure, yes folks, this is the new bottom up process so that policies to create sustainable communities will be driven by you and your fellow parishioners and not by the civil servants in Whitehall. I look forward with interest to see how well this will work.

Village Pride Committee

We have had our second meeting and the minutes will be circulated in due course.

A new planting area has been created around the Banwell sign on the Wolvershill road. The "Banwell in Bloom" team are going to include this area in their future planting scheme.

I have been in contact with Mr Adrian Leonard (NSC) for an update about the cutting back of hedges with flailing equipment in Golling Lane. Mr Leonard has come up with the proposal that North Somerset Council will pay a 1/3rd of the costs if Banwell PC pays a 1/3rd and the "Route to School Fund" would pay the final 1/3rd. Estimated total costs would be £1000. Mr Leonard to email the Parish Clerk with his funding proposal and this to become an agenda item for the PC's approval.

The area around the seat in Golling Lane. I intend to propose removing the brambles and undergrowth and replacing with grass and fencing around the border to make a quiet area for parishioners to sit and enjoy



the views across the village to Banwell Hill. But first there is a need to carry out a feasibility study and costs.

As Golling Lane is listed as a bridleway,

there are 'step-ins' (for horses to pass) which again have become badly overgrown. I intend to propose these should be cleared and paving slabs be laid to provide a safer place to stand. Again there is a need to carry out a feasibility study and costs.

Eight bags of green waste were taken from the footpath – Knightcott to Wolvershill Paddocks in our tidy-up program, we hope to look at the West Street to Littlefields footpath next.

We have purchased a Hi-Vis waistcoat in order to check quality and size before we provide all of the "Banwell in Bloom" team a coat. This is to reduce the likelihood of an accident. The next time you see our volunteers near our busy roads please give them a cheer and a wave.

Plastic Recycling

You can now recycle plastic types 1 and 2 at eight points across North Somerset.

The amount of plastic waste generated annually in the UK is estimated to be nearly 3 million tonnes. Where possible avoid buying over-packaged products and refill plastic containers.

Please recycle the remaining plastic you may have at the following plastic recycling points:

Backwell - Recycling Centre

Nailsea - Clevedon Road Car Park

Portishead - Recycling Centre

Portishead - Waitrose

Weston-super-Mare - Recycling Centre

Weston-super-Mare - Tesco

Winscombe - The Woodborough Pub

We currently accept the two most common types of plastic - Type 1 PET (PETE) and Type 2 (HDPE).

Type 1, or Polyethylene Terephthalate, is commonly used to make soft drink and cooking oil bottles.

Type 2, or High Density Polyethylene, is mainly used to make milk and detergent bottles.

You can identify what type of plastic you have by looking for

an embossed triangular logo around the base with the numbers 1 or 2 in the centre as shown in the picture.



We cannot accept other plastic types for recycling because, at the moment, it is difficult to do and expensive.

It's Leap Year!

This is a Leap Year - February has 29 days in it, bringing the total days for 2008 to 366.

Leap years happen every four years, but this one is more unusual: this February has five Fridays in it. The last time a February had 5 Fridays was in 1980 and next time will be in 2036.

So - which years are leap years? In the Gregorian calendar, used by most modern countries, the following rules decide which years are leap years:

- Every year divisible by 4 is a leap year.

- But every year divisible by 100 is NOT a leap year

- Unless the year is also divisible by 400, then it is still a leap year. This means that year 1800, 1900, 2100, 2200, 2300 and 2500 are NOT leap years, while 2000 and 2400 ARE leap years. (Not that any of us will be around in 2400 to care.)

Leap years keep the calendar in alignment with the earth's motion around the sun. If we used a calendar with only ever 365 days, we'd end up 0.2422 days wrong a year - that's about six hours. Not much to begin with but in 50 years we'd be 12 days ahead of the seasons. By adding a leap year, the calendar follows the seasons much more closely.



Modern Art

An introduction to Modern Art - What's it supposed to be?

In three evenings at Winscombe Community Centre, one each in March, April and May, David Cuthbert, celebrated local artist, teacher and co-director of the Mendip Painting Centre, will be giving illustrated talks on the origins and development of modern art.

These evenings will be informal affairs and discussion will be encouraged. David will be drawing on forty years of study and his own understanding as a practising artist. He has exhibited widely and has work in collections in Australia, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, UK, and USA. 

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Nunc Dimittis

Waiting is a common human experience. Sometimes the waiting is for good and exciting things: a birthday to arrive or a wedding day to dawn. At other times the waiting is anxious and worrying: exam results or news of loved ones serving in the forces. The waiting rooms at the doctor or dentist often have that air of anxiety and foreboding. Our lives are made up of waiting that leads to encounter, and the waiting requires patience and humility. Milton wrote in his blindness, 'They also serve who only stand and wait' as he wondered what he could do for God's kingdom now that his sight had gone.

Simeon in this month's painting of the 'Presentation of Christ' had been waiting. He belonged to a people who had been waiting for centuries. He was heir to the hopes and dreams of a nation waiting for a better world now that the holy city was in the hands of Roman invaders. With his people he clung to the hope that God would come to bring freedom and a new life. God's chosen one. the Messiah, would bring this about. When it came, there was no fanfare, no warning, just an ordinary family from faraway Nazareth in the Temple, performing the religious duties for the firstborn son. But the waiting led to encounter, and the sight of the newborn child led to insight as Simeon recognised that light and salvation had at last come.

Rembrandt has captured all this in his painting, 'Simeon with the Christ Child in the Temple': the faith and patience, the hope and humility of an old man, a priest, who takes the babe into his arms and blesses God. It was the artist's last painting and left unfinished at his death in 1669. The figure of Mary by Simeon's side may have been painted by another artist at a later stage. It is the aged priest and the newborn babe



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that impress us as we look: Simeon with his venerable beard and eyes half closed, and the tiny child cradled in his strong arms, looking up intently with his eyes open.

As Rembrandt painted this canvas, was he saying something about his own life? He had not been afraid to paint his portrait at various stages - at 21, at 35, at 53 - a total of 60 portraits covering the span of years. And in all of them, whatever the age, the artist looks out from the canvas at us, asking what a 21 year old, a 35 year old, a 53 year old can say to us and teach us.

In this final painting the years have moved on as we see Simeon, mouthing 'Nunc dimittis' with his eyes half closed. Is the waiting over and the journey coming to an end, so that his eyes will fully close? Or will he open them to see that with the babe in his arms, God has more in store: the promise of a future as they step out together on a new journey?

Farmer Support

The pursuit of cheap food coupled with the buying power of the big supermarkets is putting farming livelihoods at risk, the Church of England has told the Competition Commission. Making farmers pay for supermarkets' own promotions is just one of a number of invisible and pernicious practices squeezing farm-gate prices.

While welcoming the broad findings in the Competition Commission's recent interim report, the Church argues that a wider debate is urgently needed on the effects of retailers extracting 'below cost' supply agreements from farmers and their effect on a sustainable and flourishing agricultural sector.

"The business practices of the major food retailers have placed considerable stress on the farming community through the use of methods which we believe to be unfair and of which consumers seem to be unaware," said the Rt Rev Michael Langrish, Bishop of Exeter, who chairs the Church's Rural Strategy Group.

" Farmers seem to be unwilling to complain or to expose these practices for fear that their produce may be boycotted by the major retailers. It is clear that the Supermarkets Code of Practice is not working."

The call for wider debate comes in the report 'Fairtrade begins at home: Supermarkets and the effect on British farming livelihoods', submitted to the Competition Commission by the Church's Ethical Investment Advisory Group (EIAG). It was researched and produced in response to concerns from members of the General Synod, the Church's 'Parliament', about the doubtful viability of many farming enterprises given the squeeze on farm-gate prices.

'That's terrible,' cried Mrs Green. 'Can we do the test over again to find the answer?'



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


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The nationally recognised POPPINS Community Cafés are coming to Banwell Village Hall on 5 March 2008, offering help and support on a variety of issues, from housing to education.
