Thought For The Month

At Easter our local churches welcomed not only regular and occasional attenders but visitors. It was good to be reminded of the diversity to be found in the Christian family - people of different races, nationalities, backgrounds and ages.

Fifty days after Easter we will celebrate the Whitsun. We will recall the time over two thousand years ago when pilgrims gathered in Jerusalem from every part of the known world for the Jewish Feast of Pentecost. It was a holiday time. In that context the first Christians had an overwhelming experience of the Holy Spirit and St. Peter preached the first open air sermon. Three thousand listeners heard him and were baptised then and there. So the Church was inaugurated, launched on the world. It was an amazing birthday. From then onwards the believers in Christ would be drawn from many nations and would speak many languages and yet be one body, one community.

We are challenged today to recognise the diversity in our churches and in our village. With the opening up of the European Union we have now been joined in this country by thousands of young people from the countries of the former Soviet Block. The largest number come from Poland but there are a good number from Lithuania and Slovakia. They are ready for any job, even if well below their academic or other qualifications. They work hard and contribute their gifts and skills as well as a natural friendliness. We also find that in our hospitals, local nursing and residential homes many qualified nurses have arrived from the Philippines. Very many of the new arrivals from these lands are practising Christians, often Catholics. They have become part and parcel of our local communities and increas-

ingly integral part of rural life. Contact with their Church is usually a first step that they take to "get their bearings". The roots of their belief are strong and they provide the rest of us with a challenge to be more welcoming, to celebrate our diversity and to be a people more open to the practical and spiritual gifts that they can offer to God, and to their faith and village.

As firms, institutions and agencies recruit extensively from Eastern Europe and beyond, it is time to ask - Are we ready to receive visitors or immigrants? How willing are we to learn about the rest of the world? How open are we to accept new ideas and new insights? How good are we, both as individuals and as church and village communities, in offering hospitality. Will we provide appropriate consideration for their material, physical and spiritual needs?

Recently I heard of churches in Aberdeen where there is standing room only as hundreds of people pack into pews and dozens more are crammed into the back. They come from Poland and are served by a Polish chaplain. They prefer to worship in their own language and they have a coffee shop that provides a useful point of information and acts as a drop-in centre.

Our local newcomers may need some points of social contact amongst themselves and it is good that the Filipino community now organizes parties, feasts and festivals in Weston-super-Mare and Bristol. But the real test of our claim to be a welcoming community will be our ability to provide a real experience of home life here. When the Spirit of God is active then barriers come down and true unity is seen to be a matter of the heart and not of language or cultural identity.

Sow fast maturing and late flowering annuals, herbs and vegetables including parsnips, early carrots and runner beans. Harden off summer bedding plants and plant out. Thin out hardy annuals, vegetables and other seedlings sown outside. Stake and support chrysanthus and any other plants that look suspect. Prune spring flowering clematis after flowering, pinch out the growing tips on bush fuchsias. Prune winter flowering heathers. Plant onion sets as soon as possible, earth up early potatoes, cut lawns keeping the mowing blades high.

Become A Councillor

This guide gives you a brief insight into parish councils. This is a very important time for the renewal of local community democracy - and this presents the ideal opportunity to revive your neighbourhood, village. Furthermore, parish councils are an effective and rewarding way to get involved in community life. It deals with local people and local matters on a day to day basis and welcomes help and interest.

What are parish councils?

There are around 10,000 community, parish and town councils in England and Wales; they are corporate bodies and local authorities. They have a powerful voice to represent local people.

What do these councils do?

Community, parish and town councils are the part of local government closest to the people. They serve the smallest area and are responsible for the most local of matters. Very importantly, these councils can “precept” - raising a sum collected with the council tax each year to improve facilities and services for local people.

In England they are called parish councils or town councils if they cover a largely urban area. In both England and Wales they are elected units of local government whose activities are controlled by Acts of Parliament. There are 10,000 community, parish

and town councils in England and Wales.

Parish, town and community councils in England and Wales have a number of basic responsibilities in making the lives of local communities more comfortable, many of which are often taken for granted. Essentially these powers fall within three main categories: representing the whole electorate within the parish; delivering services to meet local needs; and striving to improve quality of life in the parish.

Individual powers include the provision and maintenance of community transport schemes, traffic calming measures, local youth projects, tourism activities, leisure facilities, car parks, village greens, public lavatories, litter bins, street lighting, street cleaning, burial grounds, allotments, bus shelters, commons, open spaces, footpaths, bridleways, and crime reduction measures.

Community, parish and town councils can also comment on planning applications - they are statutory consultees (they have to be consulted if they so wish) and can be represented at public inquiries.

Parish, town and community councils may soon be granted more powers, especially as part of Quality Status. When councils are awarded this status they are allowed to negotiate with the local principal authorities (the district or county council or unitary authority) that certain responsibilities get devolved to the parish. This is part of the government’s initiative to revitalise local democracy.

Expert Patients Programme

The Expert Patients Programme is a self-management programme delivered by lay people for anyone living with any long term or chronic health condition(s) and is run by The National Health Service.

Groups of 8 - 16 participants, with a mix of conditions, meet over six weekly sessions and are led through a structured course by trained tutors who are also living with a long-term or chronic health condition.

Each session (lasting two and a half hours) looks at ways to manage the effects of their long-term conditions such as :-

- Dealing with pain and long term tiredness
- Coping with feelings of depression
- Relaxation techniques and exercise
- Healthy eating

Communicating with family, friends and health professionals

Planning for the future

The course is FREE to anyone living with a long-term chronic health condition and will be held at St James Church Hall in Winscombe commencing Tuesday 22 June 2006 (2pm to 4.30pm) and thereafter each Tuesday through to 27 July 2006.

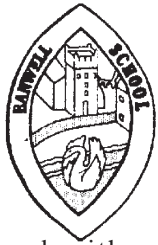

12 ideas to help you save water

The typical household could save the equivalent of 15 baths of water every week. Here's some ideas of how to do it...

1. A dripping tap can waste as much as 90 litres a week.
2. Brushing your teeth with the tap running wastes almost nine litres a minute.
3. Cool water kept in the fridge means you won't have to run the tap for ages to get a cold drink.
4. Don't use your washing machine until you've got a full load. The average wash needs about 95 litres.
5. Every time you boil an egg save the cooled water for your houseplants. They'll benefit from the nutrients released from the shell.
6. Fit a water-saving device in the cistern of your toilet and save about three litres a flush.
7. Grow your grass a little longer. It will stay greener than a closely mown lawn and need less watering.
8. Hoeing stimulates the growth of plants, reduces water loss from the soil surface and removes weeds that take up valuable water and nutrients.
9. Just taking a five-minute shower every day, instead of a bath, will use a third of

the water, saving you up to 400 litres a week.

10. Kettles should be filled with enough water for your needs, not to the brim.

11. Mulch for moisture in the garden. Add a layer of tree bark, compost, coconut husks or even newspaper to keep the sun off the soil and retain precious moisture.

Unable To Visit Your Local Library?

Eat more fruit!

Eating even MORE than the recommended five portions of fruit and vegetables a day can help cut the risk of a stroke. Recent research by the University of London has found that people who eat three to five portions cut the risk by 11 per cent compared with those eating fewer than three, and those who eat more than five servings lower it by 26 per cent.

More than five fruits and vegetables a day: such a simple and non-expensive lifestyle change. But in the UK alone, it could mean 40,000 fewer strokes a year.
