Persevere...

To the end? Absolutely right. "To him that overcomes will I give to eat of the tree of life which is in the midst of the paradise of God," said the Lord to John on Patmos as he was in the Spirit on the Lord's day. John could have spent his time feeling bitter about his cruel exile. But he didn't. Quieted under the hand of God, he received the most fabulous revelation of Jesus Christ and his future that any man has ever received, and as a result, wrote the Spirit-breathed book of Revelation. It's no good giving up halfway.

Wilberforce didn't. He and his friends of the Clapham Group were born into a godless, repressive, cynical and violent world. Sound familiar? Annual consumption of gin in the mid-18th century averaged three gallons per person and stealing a handkerchief could send a child to the gallows. MPs purchased their seats. All arguments about slavery and child labour were utterly ignored. Through ceaseless prayer and unswerving dedication, William Wilberforce and his friends set about transforming society and changing the character of Britain, in Wilberforce's phrase, "made goodness fashionable". After 20 years and as many attempts, on 25th March, 1807, the Abolition of the Slave Trade Bill was passed, a depiction of which the must-see film 'Amazing Grace' gives a heart-stopping and graphic account. In 1833, the year of Wilberforce's death, the Bill to end Slavery itself was passed.

In 1886 a young man, aged 22, lost his job as a store clerk and the following year became a partner in a small store, which failed. The next year he fell in love and courted a girl for four years, after which she said no. Later another sweetheart died. Aged 37, on his third try he was elected to the state legislature. But two years later he lost the re-election. Aged 40, he was rejected for a political appointment and had a nervous breakdown. Aged 41, his four-year-old son died. At 45, he was defeated for the Senate and at 47, for Vice President. Aged 49, he was again defeated for the Senate. Aged 51, he was elected president of the United States. His name was Abraham Lincoln.

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith."

Weekends Really Are Wetter

What you've always suspected is true: weekends really do get more clouds and rain, with more sunshine appearing on Monday, as you head back to the office.

A recent study involving 14 years of weather data from 12 sites has revealed that on average, the weather is colder, wetter and less sunny at the weekend.

Statistically, Monday and Tuesday are the sunniest days, while Saturday is the most humid and least sunny. Scientists have found this to be especially true in industrially developed regions, and blame it on 'aerosols' – tiny particles from traffic and industry suspended in the air. These particles, which reflect sunlight back into space and increase cloud production, build up during the main working days and affect the weekend weather.

The average weekend temperature is 0.2 degrees lower than on weekdays, and there are at least 15 minutes less sunshine on Saturday and Sunday than during the week. So- take Monday as your day off – if you possibly can!

The Pearl Of Great Value

Tracy Chevalier's novel, 'Girl with a Pearl Earring' and the subsequent film of the book brought to life the Dutch born artist



Vermeer and 17th century Delft, but also captured the magical quality of his paintings. Vermeer's house in Delft must have been a busy one with 11 children and in-laws com-

ing and going, and yet all his paintings convey a world of concentration and stillness amid the bustle that surrounded his life.

As we look at 'Woman Holding a Balance,' which was painted around 1664, we see a well-to-do woman surveying her wealth laid out in glowing pearls and gold on the table. Light comes shyly in from the window to illuminate the scene as we focus not just on the pearls on the table, but on the pearl of new life in her womb. For she is pregnant, and the painting has the flavour of medieval annunciation scenes with divine light transforming a human Mary.

There are three sorts of light falling on this domestic setting: the light stealing in at the side, but also the light we bring from our world as we recall the parable of the merchant finding the pearl of great value in Matthew's Gospel. Which is the greater, we might ask: earthly possessions or new life within? And the third light is shed from the painting within the painting that hangs on the wall behind the woman. It is of the Last Judgement where all is movement and action for souls are being weighed in an eternal balance: some are accepted, others are found wanting.

New life calls the woman from within. Pearls and gold call from the table. Jesus calls from the canvas behind. Where will the woman turn to find meaning and hope not just for herself, but for her child yet to be born? And material and eternal values call out to each of us. We are all like that merchant in the parable searching for fine pearls, and we are all like this woman weighing up where to place our hope and trust.

Home Information Packs

By the 1st June 2007 anyone deciding to move home will have to obtain a Home Information Pack (HIP) from a solicitor before they can move home. There have been a lot of negative comments about these new HIPs, but what do they really mean to people who want to move home after 1st June 2007 when they become compulsory?

"Anyone wanting to move home at the moment simply has to call a few estate agents and instruct one or more of them to market their property. There is absolutely no legal requirement to comply with at present. From 1st June 2007 it will not be that easy for someone to put their house on the market, they will have to obtain a HIP before they can do so" says Marc Humphries, conveyancing specialist at John Hodge Solicitors Weston-super-Mare office.

Who will provide the HIP?

The documentation contained in a HIP is largely legal information and should ultimately be provided by your solicitor. The last solicitors who helped you move home should let you have more information about HIPs when you come to move or we can provide our own guide if you email newsletter@johnhodge.co.uk.

What will be in the HIP?

The HIP has two parts, compulsory items that you must include, along with some optional items.

Compulsory items for the HIP:

- A Home Information Pack Index
- The Sale Statement confirming the sellers name, the address of the property

being sold, whether it is freehold or leasehold and registered or unregistered land.

- An Energy Performance Certificate (this confirms on a scale of A to G how energy efficient the property is).
- Evidence of the Title of the Property
- Local and drainage and water searches
- Additional information for leasehold and commonhold sales

Optional Extras in the Pack

- A legal summary (often at the front of the pack) prepared by the solicitors acting on the sale of the property.
- A Home Condition Report, including a Home Inspectors report, and forms confirming information on boundaries, any disputes, notices, guarantees and details of planning and building regulations.
- A Home Use Form (confirming what is being included in the sale of the property)
- Other searches

How much will a HIP cost?

Whilst there are many companies stating that the HIP will cost several hundred pounds, the reality is that the additional costs will amount to only between £200 to £300 over and above costs that would be incurred if you move home before 1st June 2007. The only compulsory additional costs are for the Pack itself (£50 - £75) and the Energy Performance Certificate (around £200).

Most of the documentation contained in the HIP is documentation that a solicitor would already provide for you when moving home, such as local searches, so these are not additional costs but simply costs included as part of the HIP now rather than charged separately.

The most enthusiastic researcher was Netty Rice who took responsibility for contacting the relatives of the fallen for family details and photographs. We are most grateful to those who so kindly provided such valuable information. Netty also spent much time visiting The Commonwealth War Graves Commission on the internet, to discover the Regiments, Ranks, dates of death and places of burial.

With the support and assistance of Roy Rice, Netty completed this monumental task and it is thanks to her that we have this publication.

Gardening Tips For May



Thin out hardy annual vegetables and other seedlings sown outdoors. Sow a short row of lettuce to

avoid a glut. Sow a short row of french and runner beans outdoors in manured soil. Plant summer and autumn cabbages, brussel sprouts and summer cauliflower in well limed soil. Plant out hardened off geraniums, petunias, busy lizzies and other summer bedding annuals and perennials when frost has finished. Control aphids and caterpillars. Mow lawns weekly if needed and treat dandelions and other broad-leaved weeds with weed killer.

Green Funeral

Would you consider a 'green funeral'?

Green funerals are becoming popular - with almost two-thirds (63%) of Brits liking the idea of an eco-coffin, usually made of wicker or cardboard. About the same number of us (64%) like the idea of a green funeral, where we are buried in a woodland or meadow.
